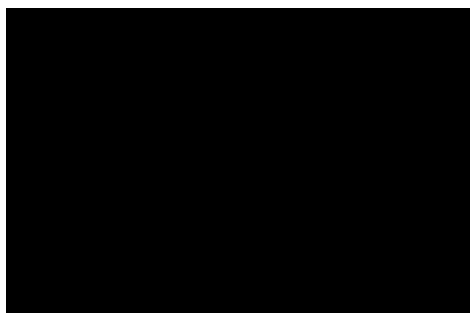


Spring Celebrations Around the World!

How Spring is Celebrated in Japan

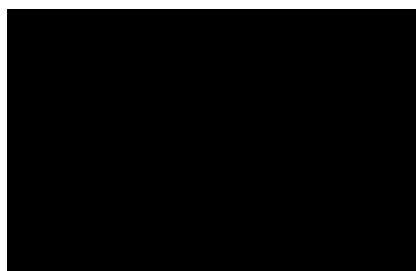
As the knee-high snow starts to slowly disappear, we anticipate the change to a warmer season. The blossoming of cherry blossoms, along with the pleasant weather in spring is symbolic in Japan. It signifies the beginning of things and marks the start of a new fiscal year.

In Japan, spring is symbolized by *hanami*. The *hanami* (cherry blossom viewing) custom started in the Heian period (late 8th century-12th century) when Emperor Saga adopted the practice of making offerings to cherry blossom trees. The trees were believed to contain deities who would, in turn, bless the country with a bountiful harvest.

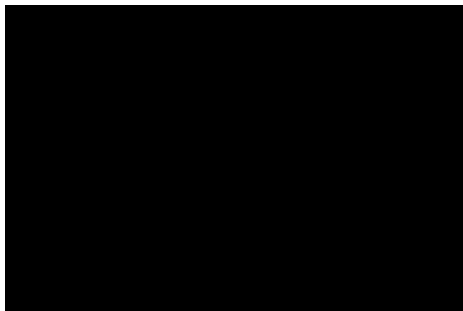
Although such flower-viewing parties were only available to the upper aristocratic society, it slowly spread throughout Japan when Tokugawa Yoshimune, the eighth shogun of the Tokugawa shogunate of Japan, planted large areas of cherry blossom trees to encourage this practice.

The popular Japanese proverb, 花より団子 *hana yori dango* or “dumpling over flowers” originated as a jab to the *hanami* tradition, as people were more often interested in the food and drinks accompanying cherry blossom viewing rather than the cherry blossoms.

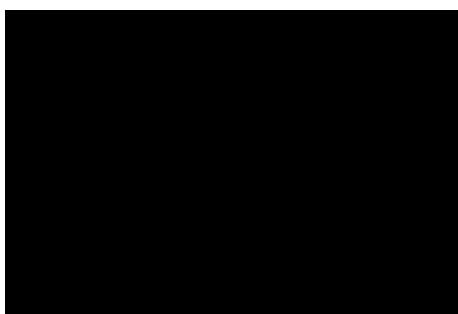


Holi

Did you know that *Color Run* was inspired by the traditional Hindu festival, *Holi*?

Holi, also known as the festival of colours, is a national holiday in India and Nepal which celebrates the beginning of spring. Traditionally, the festival celebrated agriculture and commemorated bountiful spring harvests and fertile land. To many Hindus, Holi marks the beginning of the new year.

Incidentally, Holi typically falls in March!



Falles

Falles is derived from the Latin word ‘torch’ and is a traditional celebration held in commemoration of Saint Joseph in Valencia, Spain. The festival is a continuous street party that lasts 5 days and nights.

During this period, everyone from small children to elderly people can be seen throwing fireworks and noisemakers in the streets. This builds up to the finale, La Cremà — where the falla (huge constructions pictured above) are burned.

Apparently, Falles has origins in the Latin custom of lighting fires to welcome spring!

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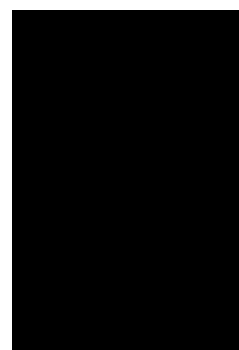
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Hanami Calendar, Japanese Proverb Trivia (pg 2)



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Some Flowery Japanese Proverbs to go Along with Hanami!

らっかえだにかえらず、はきょうふたたびてらさず
落花枝に返らず、破鏡再び照らさず
Literal meaning: Fallen blossoms do not return to the branches, a broken mirror does not reflect again.
Meaning: What is lost is lost.

みぬがはな
見ぬが花
Literal meaning: Not seeing is a flower.
Meaning: Reality cannot compete with imagination.

たかねのはな
高嶺の花
Literal meaning: Flower on a cliff
Meaning: A Pishah sight, something out of one's reach

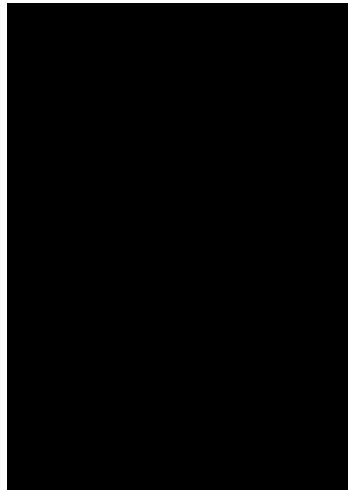
